Over the past weekend I was blessed to witness a sea of ~200 faithful parishioners dressed in black and white who partook in Sydney's Youth Association event - the Annual Walkathon (Sunday 21st June).

The fundraiser aimed to raise funds for the displaced Christians of the Middle East, specifically towards ACERO's Syria Appeal. Along with other noble causes in the local community; Breast Cancer Foundation and the Children's Starlight Foundation.

Personally, the highlight of the day was interacting with the numerous staff members and students of our beautiful College who partook in this worthy cause. It was a great initiative to see four staff members and twenty-one students amongst their brethren in the walk for hope, love and peace.

College Events- Science Faculty

In Science, Year 8 this year were asked to assemble models that contained some sort of energy transformation. This allowed us as students to think outside the box. It was a chance to be creative. From a student's perspective, not all kids enjoy constantly reading from textbooks and writing down notes, however, using our imagination to create a toy model captivated a much larger audience and is a good way to involve all students from various academic levels. This was conducted under the guidance of Mrs. Kaur who provided us with examples of models and assisted us with our models.

Some models that were quite interesting included sail boats, cross bows, a rocket, a slingshot, cars and much more. Students introduced new ideas and used various materials to assemble their models. Yousif Sabbagh and Sargis Youkhataz from 8P produced a cross bow, the energy transformation used was elastic potential energy to kinetic energy and lastly to heat.

Odet Ishak and Mary Chimoun from 8M came up with a toy car made from a recycled water bottle, an interesting aspect to this model was that they used bottle caps to represent the wheels of the car which was unique. Another interesting car model was created by Kewarkees Sharlman and Jason John from 8M, this was a balloon driven car which worked on Newton's 3rd law. Tony Esho and Ashoram Shlemon also assembled a car and the intriguing thing is they all managed to create the same model using various designs and materials.

Hormoz Rashidian and Saan Ablahad created a sparkler rocket which required a lot of work and was aesthetically pleasing. Andy Hormoz created a sling shot and Lina Ishak and Mark Merza from 8P created sail boats which transform wind energy into kinetic energy.

All students were required to provide an explanation for their models. This explanation included where the inspiration was gained from, materials used, and a description of the energy transformation included what energy was useful and wasted.

Assyrian in Action

On Monday 22nd and Tuesday 23rd of June, the three Year 7 classes; 7M, 7P & 7D participated in a cooking activity related to their unit of work in Assyrian. The unit of work they have been focusing on this term is 'Ordering Food'.

Year 7 were handed an assignment in which they had to create a recipe of traditional Assyrian food. Once they had written their recipe, they cooked it during class time.

The students did an outstanding job in cooking the food. They were prepared with ingredients and they behaved appropriately. I would like to commend them for this level of achievement and for putting in so much effort. All food was nut and egg free. Some foods that were cooked included: Dolma, Biryani, Baqlava, Red Rice and salad, Kooba and Kebabs. The food tasted delicious.

Huge thanks to Mr Taouk, Mrs Rashidi and Mary Mooshi for giving up their time and assisting in this practical lesson where students linked theory with practice.

Mr Dinkha also visited the classes while students were working and commended Year 7 for co-operating, being organised and working well were they helped to make it an efficient, enjoyable and safe lesson.

This activity helped give the students an understanding of foods in Assyrian culture as well as allowing them to have some fun and give them a break from doing worksheet this whole term.





College Events- DLN Faculty

The DLN department looks after: special needs students, Intensive English (IEC) and English as Additional Language students (EAL/D). This has been a very busy term for the DLN department especially with the IEC students. We have had the greatest influx of IEC students this term alone in the history of the school. These students have escaped from horrific situations in their home countries (Iraq, Syria and Lebanon) and are trying to find their feet in our beautiful, welcoming country of Australia.

The students are divided into two groups, depending on their English levels: Beginner and Intermediate. After the students complete one year in the IEC they graduate as ESL students into the mainstream.

In English this term the beginner students have studied the novel Balto and the intermediate students have studied the novel Red Dog. Both texts challenge the students with comprehension and English. Red Dog is an Australian novel and the students learn all about Australian idioms and culture. The students also learnt: summarising skills, sentence structure, grammar techniques, spelling and building their vocabulary.

In their History class the intermediate students have been learning about Ancient Egypt. The students attended an excursion earlier this term to the IMAX theatre in Darling Harbour to watch a documentary titled: Egypt 3D- Secrets of the Mummies. The students also had to complete a project in pairs where they were required to research a specific pharaoh of Ancient Egypt. In Maths the beginner students have focused on: Graphs, co- ordinate geometry, fractions & percentages, whilst the intermediate students focused on: co - ordinate geometry, shapes, area, volume and circles and cylinders.

The IEC students are some of the hardest working students in the school. Their eagerness to learn and become educated is an inspiration for others. All in all it has been a fantastic term for the DLN department. I would personally like to thank my DLN colleagues Lynn Middlebrook, Katrina Yip, Aaron Pillay and Tarek Taouk who work so hard producing fantastic lessons for these students.
