#### Dear Parents, Students & Friends,

As we come to the end of another term, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our students, parents and staff for their collective contribution to a very productive term three. 

### Message from the Counsellor

Why are our children changing when they hit high school and get older?

As parents you witness your children change dramatically from year to year – more specifically, from primary school to high school. The child that you would've picked up from primary school a couple of years ago would enter your car with a BIG smile and tell you everything they did at school that day. They are excited and happy to be with you. Today, the same child enters your car with neutral face, no talking, no smiling, and busy texting and Facebooking away (because the school has a no phone policy) all the way home.

Most parents starting questioning: what is wrong with my child? Why and how have they changed so much? Is this our fault as parents? Is it the school's fault? Or is it my child's friends that influence him/her to be what they have become today?

Because we are lost in all of these questions, we become angry and try to fix it. We start verbally (and sometimes physically – which is illegal!) attacking our children thinking it is beneficial and that something good has to come out of it.

For the parents of our students that were born and raised in Australia, this may be irrelevant to you. However, for our beloved parents that were born and raised outside Australia (Iraq, Iran, Syria, Lebanon, Asia, etc.) this article may be of some aid to you.


Our children are constantly fighting a psychological war; a war in their minds that traps them with our family's tradition and way of life against the culture and trends of our Australian multicultural society. Our family's household tells us swearing is wrong, while movies and series on the television make it look right. Our family's household tells us sexual intercourse is wrong before marriage, while movies and series on the television make it look right. Our family's household tells us communication and a relationship with parents and siblings is vital, while movies and series on the television tell us to start dating (at a VERY early stage) and create close relationships with boyfriends and girlfriends rather than family members. This is the psychological war our children are facing.

Naturally, children hit puberty in their high school days and within the process of puberty children trying to make sense of life. Starting probing deeper into why things happen and things are the way they are. Symbolically, our children are stuck in a round-a-bout figuring out their way and which exit to take.

A tip for parents: do not intervene and obstruct your child's way because obstructing traffic only leads to an accident – especially at a round-a-bout. Imagine trying to interfere with the Polding St and Smithfield

Rd HUGE round-a-bout, luckily they're transforming that into a traffic light.

Moral of the article: you have raised your children well in their childhood (pre-primary and primary stages of their lives), it is now time to allow them to use their wings and fly. If we've taught our children well, they will fly in the right direction. If they do, however get lost along the way remember that they will find hardship and through all the pain and misery they will find the right path the hard way.



# College Events: Year 7 History Excursion to the Nicholson

**Museum and IMAX Cinema** 

On Friday the 5<sup>th</sup> of September our Year 7 Egyptologists had a chance to get a closer look at the ancient world of the pharaohs. First stop was Australia's oldest university museum. Here students had the opportunity to examine ancient artefacts and record their finding. They were also taken on a guided tour of Australia's widest collection of Egyptian artefacts including mummies, sculptures and inscriptions. More than one student took the opportunity to get a selfie with a mummy!

After an informative and entertaining tour, we made our way to the world's largest cinema screen. The students were enthralled as they were transported into the fascinating world of ancient Egypt to witness a re-enactment of the discovery of the tomb of Rameses II in three dimensions.

The students behaviour throughout the day was a credit to themselves and the school, and the excursion provided teachers and students with a more detailed and vivid perspective of Egypt.



# College Events: Year 7 History Excursion to the Nicholson

Museum and IMAX Cinema cont'd



On Friday 5<sup>th</sup> September, Year 7 went on an excursion to the Nicholson Museum in Sydney University and IMAX theatre, to deepen our knowledge of ancient Egypt, as that is what we are currently studying in history. We were accompanied by Ms Nona, Ms Kako, Miss David, Mr Scarpinato.

On arriving at the Nicholson Museum, we were given a quick tour which educated us on ancient civilisations, namely ancient Egypt and ancient Greece. During the ancient Egyptian sector of the tour, we learnt about the

mummification and embalming procedure used to bury dead Pharaohs and wealthy Egyptians. We looked at mummified bodies, some of which were left in their Sarcophagus, others in their linen wrappings, and a few completely unwrapped body parts. A head and a few hands were generously donated by unknown benefactors, who, because buying mummified body parts was once legal, had no more use or space for them.

During the ancient Greek sector of the tour, we looked at an Athenian temple, the Acropolis, and reviewed some of its history with our guide, Alina. We then went down to a room which gave us a hands-on experience where we could touch real ancient artefacts, such as Canoptic Jars, statues of a varied range, a crooked nail, pieces of ancient pottery and a roof tile, all from different periods of time.

We then went to the IMAX theatre to watch *Egypt 3D: Secrets of the Mummies*. It was a fascinating movie, which gave us a better insight of Egyptian beliefs, traditions, mummification processes and their way of life. It specifically highlighted King Ramses II, and The Valley Of The Kings. It told Howard Carter's story, and how he discovered the first tomb which had not one mummy, but over 60. It highlighted The Great Temple of Ramses II, and explained why it was built – so that the world would remember the name Ramses II for generations to come. We then ate lunch at Darling Harbour, and got on the bus to go back to school.

Overall it was a fun, educational experience from which everyone benefitted.
