MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL


Dear Parents, Guardians and Friends,




Next week marks that middle of Term Three and staff will be working on analysing collected data by comparing Semester One student performance data with Term Three student formative assessment trends as well as student academic behaviour, i.e., their personal motivation, self-efficacy and value expectancy. The aim of this regular exercise is for staff to use analysis from data to identify ways to support all learners and to get teachers to focus on all learners' progress, in particular, to focus on learners who are showing limited progress and/ or improvements in this term.

I would like here to remind parents of the crucial role they play in their children's education and their critcial role in helping their children's personal growth and academic success.





I am delighted to announce that the College will be introducing a Selective Stream for a small number of Year 7 2021 students. More information on this program is provided later in this newsletter.

HSC Trail Exams

From Monday, 17th August, our fantastic Year 12 students will be sitting their HSC Trial exams for two weeks. At the end of these exams, students will be back to their normal classes continuing their formal HSC studies for a further five weeks as they prepare for the final HSC exams in Term Four.

A number of these students have also been extremely busy completing, finishing off and submitting their practical projects, major designs, works and performances across few subjects. We extend to them all our best wishes as they do their best to finalise their submissions in their respective HSC courses.

Year 12 Graduation

As is customary at end of Term Three each year, we celebrate our Year 12 completion of their HSC studies by holding a special graduation ceremony attended by all Year 12 students, their parents / guardians and many other special Guests. Unfortunately, due to the current COVID-1 restrictions this year's Graduation Ceremony scheduled for the 22nd of September 2020 we will only be able to have 150 people in Edessa Hall. This means that apart form 109 Year 12 students, there will only be space for 41 people, which means this event will have to run without parents. We will need many staff to assist with running the event and allow spaces for limited number of special guests. We are planning to video the whole ceremony and make that available to all parents and their families the next day, so you can be part of this very special and wonderful milestone.

Please note that COVID-19 restrictions may unfortunately become tougher later in the coming weeks and that may lead to cancellation of the whole event.

Parent / Teacher Interviews

Thank you to all parents that made the time to speak to their child's teachers during the parent teacher interviews. It was the first time that we have had to use the phone or Teams interviews and we were very pleased of the way the process ran. It was encouraging to see the many appointments made and parents taking the opportunity to talk about their child's progress.



Subject Selection process

The Year 11 2021 Subject Selection process commenced today.

As part of the subject selection process, an information evening is usually held for parents and students. Unfortunately, due to COVID 19 restrictions, the scheduled subject information evening has had to be cancelled for this year.

Instead, all students received a copy of the handbook and subject selection form today. Year 10 students have had subject information sessions in class this week where important information was given to them about the HSC and the subject process. These will continue into next week.

Subject Selection Interviews for Year 11 2021 will commence on Wednesday 19th August 2020 and continue on Thursday 20th August during the day. Panels made up of the Deputy Principals and Head Teachers of various departments will interview and make recommendations to students about their subject selection choices. The Careers Advisor, Mrs Kattos, will also be available to assist students with their selections and any questions that they may have about their future career paths.

To enable the process to proceed efficiently during school time, parents will not be required to attend these interviews. Instead, please ensure that you have discussed with your child their subject choices and signed the form. No forms will be accepted unless they have been signed by a parent or quardian.

Subject selection forms will be collected during the interviews. Your child will then be given a username and password to enter the approved subjects into an online system. The system will then generate the subjects according to the best fit for all students. To ensure that all students have the opportunity to enter their subjects at the same time, the online system will be available from 4.30pm on Friday 21st August to 4.30pm on Tuesday 25th August.



Please contact me if you have any questions or you would like to discuss your child's subject selection. The subject selection process for Year 9 2021 will commence in the coming weeks. Further information will be sent home with students next week.

COVID Safe practices

We are continuing to follow all health, hygiene and safety protocols for students and staff. The following measures will be taken during the upcoming trial HSC exams from next week:

- Social distancing with tables set apart
- Examinations will be spread throughout more rooms than previous years to reduce the number of students in the same room at any given time.
- Students will not be allowed to borrow stationery or other items
- · Cleaners will disinfect all tables before and after each exam
- Hand sanitiser is available for students to disinfect before they enter the exam rooms
- Any student with flu like symptoms is advised to stay home and alternative arrangements for the exams
 will be made. They will need to complete an illness and misadventure form and attach a medical
 certificate. Students should refer to the assessment handbook for more details on this process.

Dear family and friends of St Narsai Assyrian Christian College,

As we approach mid term 3, it is a great opportunity to reflect on what has been a busy and fruitful few weeks for both staff and learners alike. Term 3 has already consisted of a variety of academic activities and initiatives to ensure active engagement for our learners and opportunities for them to achieve their personal best.

Year 8 Geography

This semester Year 8 have started learning about Geography for the first time this year. This term will focus on developing the knowledge and skills learners can apply as they developing their understanding of Water in the World. They have already started developing a practical skill set by interpreting statistical data and using that to estimate water usage patters in Australia, Indonesia and around the world. The learners have also used their understanding of the different forms of water and how that works towards creating their Water Footprint.

Each learner has had the opportunity to apply their understanding by calculating their own Water Footprint in order to broader their understanding of their impact on Australia's freshwater usage and what they can do to make a difference moving forward.

The knowledge the learners have gained so far this term has already had countless practical applications and provided them with cross-curriculum learning opportunities. This can be seen through the conversion of data to calculate their water footprint, utilising Mathematics skills, as well as learning about the Water Cycle where learners were provided with the opportunity to apply their knowledge of the processes involved in renewing water, incorporating knowledge from Science and more."

Usually in my free time I love to recreate historical artefacts and one of my recent recreations is the lyre or the harp of the ancient Sumerian city of Ur in modern day Iraq. Selective Stream

Did you know that St Narsai Assyrian Christian College is now offering a Selective Stream for Year 7 from 2021?

What is a Selective Stream?

A Selective Stream is when higher ability students are placed in a selective class that has been designed to provide them with learning opportunities on top of the normal curriculum to help them master their critical and creative thinking skills. These skills are the foundation of developing deeper understanding and application of knowledge allowing students to move on to the next level of learning. The subject content for each course will still share a common curriculum but will be taught in a way that challenges these students and allows them to fulfil their potential in all curriculum areas.

How will it run?

This 'Selective Stream' class will be the same class across all subjects. Students will need to demonstrate they are working at a higher level across most, if not, all of their subjects throughout the year.

Students are not guaranteed a position in this selective group. They need to ensure they are consistently achieving excellent results across all subjects before they are considered for selective stream and while they are in selective stream. Student behaviour will also be considered. Students who are underperforming or demonstrate poor behaviour will be warned, and may be removed from the Selective Stream at any time of the year.

Who can apply?

Current Year 6 students enrolling at St Narsai Assyrian Christian College to begin Year 7 in 2021 are invited to apply. Applicants must be students who demonstrate that they are committed to learning and their commitment is reflected in their current grades and positive approach to learning.

How do I apply?


While in Year 6, students sit a General Ability Test which assesses their literacy, numeracy and abstract thinking. Further, NAPLAN results as well as the Year 6 school report will be used to determine a successful applicant.

Students are invited to submit an Expression of Interest form which can be downloaded from stnarsai.nsw.edu.au to be considered for the Selective Stream.
