SUMMER UNIFORM

A reminder that:

The girls' skirts must reach the knee

Socks must cover the ankle

Please refer to the student diary for appropriate and inappropriate hairstyles for boys. I emphasise that a 2 is the minimum for a male haircut, no lines, or uppercuts are permitted. Hair is to be blended on both sides of the head.

For girls, hair needs to be of a natural colour and tied back at all times.

No acrylic - no notes will be accepted.

No piercings for boys and only piercings in the lower ear lobe for girls with one earring on each ear

We thank parents for their ongoing support in ensuring these guidelines are continually being met.

STUDENTS WHO WORK

According to the Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) (Child Employment) Regulation 2015 found on https://www.legislation.nsw.gov.au/#/view/regulation/2015/782/full

A child of compulsory school age (up to the age of 16 years old) has the following restrictions on employment;

must not be employed during hours of normal school attendance or when they are required to be attending school

must not be employed for more than one shift on any one day.

must not be employed for more than 5 consecutive days (5 days in order)

a child must not be employed for more than 4 hours on any day on a day in which they have attended or are required to attend school

The maximum hours that may be worked on days other than school days are;

A child must be given:

within any 4-hour period—an appropriate number of rest breaks, of an appropriate duration, taking into account the age and needs of the child and the nature of the work the child is engaged in, and

a 1-hour rest break every 4 hours.

A child must not start work with an employer less than 12 hours after the child has previously finished work, whether for that employer or another employer. (For example, if a child finishes work at 9pm, they cannot work the next shift until after 9am the next day)

A child must not work later than 9.00 pm on any day if the child is to receive schooling on the following day.

The total period of time for which a child is employed during any week, when added to the time that the child is at school during that week, must not exceed 50 hours.

On a final note, today the world celebrates World Teachers' Day. I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and commend our very hard-working, dedicated and selfless teachers who always out our students first. St Narsai Assyrian Christian College is blessed to have expert educators such as yourselves with us.

Once again, I look forward to seeing all of our parents/carers at our official opening on Sunday.

Another term has started as students returned from their holidays to participate in new learning opportunities in our College to build up on their previous skills.

During this term, students started adding new skills to their learning and be more able to communicate in Assyrian Language within different contexts.

Year 7 started a new unit of work about making friends where they learn how to use their oral communication skills to introduce themselves to each other. Watching students speaking their mother tongue when introducing themselves to each other, made us very proud.

Year 8 started this term learning about different types of sports and athletics competitions, which they practise in our College within their sport program. Students are learning how to improve their writing skills and learning about the importance of Sport on human's physical and mental health.

As for Stage 5, Year 9 students started learning this term about writing their memories about their travelling to various places, cities or countries. They are learning how to capture those happy, sad or special moments and write them in their personal diary. This will eventually assist them in improving their literacy skills, particularly writing.

Year 10 students, on the other hand, have learned in term 3 about employment, targeting how to write their resume and prepare for a job interview. As a continuous topic, this term students started learning about their aspiration, what they would like to be in future and the steps they need to put to reach their goal and ambition in life.
