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

NAPLAN tests for years 7 and 9 students are coming up in May next term. In my last newsletter article, I recommended that students practise past NAPLAN papers either online or by using the NAPLAN books that are available to purchase from bookstores or newsagencies.

An additional and important way to improve literacy skills and for preparing for the tests is through reading widely. Students can borrow books from the school or local libraries. All students have access to our digital library collection available at https://stnarsai.eplatform.co. On this platform, students can access fiction and non-fiction books with over 3200 titles available in audio and eBook format. Students can also browse the books that are available for them to borrow, reserve and renew books as they need to. All students have been given their username and password to be able to access the collection. ## LSU Faculty

An inclusive school is one in which children with disabilities and special educational needs are included in the educational arrangements made for the majority of students. Inclusion is the development of strategies that seek to bring about a genuine equalisation of opportunities and that all children should learn together.

The Learning Support Unit at SNACC assists the school to cater for those students in regular classes who are experiencing difficulties in basic areas of learning. The LAST and Teacher's Aides, working with the executive and staff, play an essential part in the whole-school approach to provide for these students. The fundamental role of the Learning and Support Teacher (LAST) and Teacher's Aides is to ensure that all children with additional needs are catered for in the mainstream school. This includes gifted and talented students.

The Learning Support Unit will be conducting meetings with parents to discuss their child's Individualised Learning Plan for 2021 inclusive of details of the support we provide. It is important that we maintain a collaborative effort when planning and implementing strategies that will assist our students in achieving their outcomes. Collaboration includes LSU staff, parents, classroom teachers, the college counsellor, Year Co-ordinator and the students themselves. Collaboration has proven to be extremely successful to support students in their learning.

Assessment time has begun in Term 1 and students have received their adjusted tasks. Some exams have taken place, where Learning Support staff have continued to provide provisions for each student in their care. This includes providing readers, writers, small group supervision, rest breaks and extra time. Provisions allow learners the adequate processing time that will enable them to access the information and effectively respond to exam questions. Students have been working hard at school and home with plenty of revision and we encourage parents to continue supporting their children to becoming independent learners.

The Gifted and Talented team have been split into two groups this term so far; the Year 10 GATs students are participating in the Mock Trials, a state-wide competition organised by the NSW Law Society. This is the first ever time St Narsai has participated in the Mock Trials and the students are eager to begin! The first round will take place in the following week and we all look forward to it. The students in Years 7-9 are currently analyzing their grades from the previous year and putting together a list of their strengths and weaknesses in order to improve for 2021. These students revised their exam and assessment marks and set goals that target the areas they seek to develop. In this way, students will become more independent and take real ownership of their learning.

Finally, as the Learning Support Co-ordinator, I would personally like to thank Mrs Abeer Haddad, Mrs Nora Dawod, Mrs Anna Andry, Mrs Lina Francis and Ms Lynn Middlebrook for their hard work, dedication and commitment to our students. They continue to support each learner, with care, compassion and patience. They have put together a Wild Minds Wall of Fame in the Learning Support room that is covered with student work samples, in acknowledgement of their assessment achievements this year. In addition, it is my pleasure to welcome three new staff members to our team, who have hit the ground running and already been so heavily involved in our students' learning. Please join me in welcoming and thanking Mrs Grace Isaac, Mrs Fayruz Sebo and Mrs Ishtar Yousef. We've got the biggest team in our school and are deeply dedicated to supporting our students in 2021 and beyond.

We look forward to seeing parents in the future, and in maintaining our collaborative efforts with the whole school community. God bless.


# **Mathematics Faculty**

#### Year 7 and 9 NAPLAN Numeracy

Our Year 7 and 9 learners have been working with their teachers to prepare them for the upcoming NAPLAN Numeracy tests. All learners have been enrolled into an online program 'Smarter Maths'. They have received login details and instructions on how to access these tests. The instructions have also been included below.



Please note that NAPLAN is now online, therefore we encourage your son/daughter to complete the assigned test to better prepare them for the final test in May 2021. The results obtained from completing these tests will help teachers identify where your son/daughter requires assistance and put in place strategies to improve their skills.






Photo: Learners completing their Numeracy Ninjas during Roll Call

3. Click login on the corner of the page.




4. Enter your email and password as given to you by your teacher. Note: the email address must be in small caps. The password is exactly as given to you "Ssnac523".

5. A screen will appear with all the tests. Select the test your teacher has asked you to complete and click start now. Note: This is a timed test. Do not begin this test if you anticipate interruptions.

## **TAS Faculty**



Our students have challenged themselves and taken risks with their learning to enable them to achieve their personal best. This year we welcomed Mrs Koryael to the Department, joining Miss Yonan, Mr Morrison, Mrs Amanoel, Mr Youkhanis and Mrs Moushi to form a wonderfully diverse and experienced TAS faculty.

There is always an air of excitement in our Year 7 and 8 Technology classes. The students will this year experience a diverse range of interesting units, closely working through the design process to produce their folio and end product. They have enjoyed developing their practical skills in the areas of: Healthy Snack foods, LED Lamps, Aprons with bags and Speaker amplifiers, they will experience different projects over the year using different technologies each term. The learners will work both independently and collaboratively in the classroom to brainstorm their ideas and evaluate their processes to produce a final product. We hope parents will enjoy seeing the many creations that have been planned and produced when they bring their projects home.

Students throughout their chosen elective courses in stage 5 and 6 will enjoy a vast range of learning tasks that will provide them the opportunity to further develop their skill set and their understanding in the different topic areas being studied. #### Collection Notice for parents/guardians 2021 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to advise you that a request has been made for your child's school to provide residential address and other information as required under the Australian Education Regulation 2013 (Cth).

The school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the

- Names and residential addresses of students' parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (excluding student names)
  Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status)

Your child's school generates a unique and unidentifiable record number for each student record. The number is only used by the school for this collection. It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose. The number indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

#### Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with data held by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to calculate a non-government school community's anticipated capacity to contribute to the costs of schooling.

From 2020, a new measure of capacity to contribute, the Direct Measure of Income (DMI), was introduced. The DMI is based on the median income of parents or guardians of students at a non-government school using data collected through the Collection. #### Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the Privacy Act 1988 (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the Australian Education Act 2013 and Australian Education Regulation 2013.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Collection may be:

- . disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP).   disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may from time to time, carry out an audit of
- a school's submission to the Collection. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with the student enrolment information held by the school and will not use the information for any other
- disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology support services to the department
- used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

- how individuals can access and seek correction of the personal inform
- how complaints about potential breaches or breaches of the Privacy Act can be made;
- how the department will deal with these complaints.

The department commissioned an independent privacy impact assessment (PIA). The PIA assesses the flows of information under the Collection, compliance with the Privacy Act and measures in place to safeguard the personal information being collected. You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the requested details to the department; however, you may wish to ensure that your school has the most up-to-date and correct details for your family.
