As we approach the end of the year, it is a great opportunity to reflect on what has been an unpredictable, busy and fruitful year for both staff and learners alike. Term 4 consisted of a variety of academic activities and initiatives to ensure active engagement for our learners and opportunities for them to achieve their personal best.

Year 7 History: Throughout Term 4 learners were provided opportunities to not only develop but also apply their understanding of historical skills through depth studies focusing on Ancient Greek and Chinese societies. This involved the study and analysis of written, archaeological and visual sources in order to form an understanding of how these ancient worlds developed over time.

Learners were able to utilise their understanding of these ancient civilisations and merge them through the use of ICT to create a visual representation of their understanding of significant individuals and where their power stems from. This understanding was displayed through multimodal formats utilising text and images such as the poster created.



Year 9 History:

Year 9 engaged in the depth study of World War II. Learners had the opportunity to expand their historical skills and apply them throughout various activities while learning and understanding the significance and events of the wars. Embedded within the activities were literacy skills which ensured learners were continuously developing and improving their writing skills. Through the analysis of sources, learners were able to form an empathetic understanding of the role of Australians at war. They were able to apply their knowledge and understanding of the significance of war through the commemoration of Remembrance Day. Learners engaged in a Remembrance Day activity and created their own souvenir to demonstrate the ways in which we commemorate the wars today.

Year 9 Commerce students learnt the ins and outs of the investing world. They have been taken through various investment options and been asked to make tactical decisions by building their own investment portfolios. Taking inspiration from like-minded business individuals on Shark Tank, students have witnessed a multitude of both successful and unsuccessful business investments, providing them with an in-depth understanding of the requirements of a profitable investment.

Lastly, I would like to congratulate Year 12 on completing their HSC exams. I have no doubt they will be successful in all their endeavours after school and their results will make the community proud. 


Visual Arts

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

Dear Parents/Carers,

As the year and term comes to an end, I've observed that other than issues with anxiety, students have been approaching me with a lot of self-confidence, body image and self-esteem concerns.

In addition to the strategies I've suggested to students, I have gathered some beneficial information from reachout.com.au which will also help you, assist your child improve their self-confidence.

Why is self-confidence important for teenagers?

Your child's self confidence is directly linked to their self-esteem, which helps them feel good about themselves and make's them feel like they're valuable. However, having high self-esteem doesn't necessarily mean that you are always confident. It is estimated that up to half of adolescents will struggle with their confidence levels during their early teenage years so it is essential they have support from their family.

What does positive self-confidence look like?

- Good posture
- A relaxed walk
- Alert eyes
- Openness to criticism and feedback
- A curiosity about new ideas
- Refusal to get upset when things go differently than planned

What are the signs of low confidence?
Somethings to look out for in your child

- Awkwardness in accepting praise
- Unconfident body language, such as walking with their head down, no eye contact
- Avoidance of social situations and negativity about others
- Not joining in activities
- Holding back in class
- Being shy or timid
- Gives in easily to peer influence
- An expectation that they will fail when trying things, or not trying when things get difficult.

Some useful strategies you can try to help:

- Discuss the difficulties they're facing.
- Encourage your child to focus on their strengths, rather than their weaknesses. Recognize your child's strengths and acknowledge them when being used.
- Remind your child that their worth is not based on their appearance or achievements.
- Remember to praise your child for their accomplishments and effort, even if they fail to reach the desired results.
- Encourage them to always be proud of themselves and keep trying – explain that its okay to fail and everyone makes mistakes but shouldn't give up.
- Discuss personal experiences you may have faced which were difficult for you and you also needed confidence to get through.

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In addition to helping your child build their self-esteem, the upcoming school holidays are a perfect opportunity to support your child to enhance and maintain their well-being. This can be done by encouraging and engaging with them in various activities to minimize the time they may be spending on their phones and/or in their rooms.

Some activities may include:

- Creating a schedule/plan of activities together
- Letting them organize a day out with the family
- having a movie night
- going for a picnic
- encouraging regular daily exercise like going for a bush walk as a family
- activities with extended family
- one on one time with their siblings
- arts and crafts activities to help with relaxation and mindfulness
- gardening e.g creating a veggie patch

If you notice things do get overwhelming for them during the school holidays, encourage them to take a Mindful BREAK whenever they need
