Half Yearly Exams and Reports

Year 11 and 12 Parent Teacher interviews were held last term. Thank you to all parents and students that made the time to attend the interviews. They were a valuable opportunity for parents and teachers to discuss the child's progress and ways for improvement. Year 12 Half Yearly and Years 7 - 11 Interim reports were distributed to parents at the end of Term 1 via email. Years 7 – 10 Half Yearly Exams are scheduled to take place in the coming weeks.

- Asking the right inquiry questions
- Pursuing and expressing novel ideas and solutions
- Leadership to turn ideas into action

- Making connections and identifying patterns
- Meaningful knowledge construction
- Experimenting, reflecting, and taking action on ideas in the real world

UNIFORM UPDATE

Lowes

As you are aware on Monday 22 May 2023, our school uniform supplier will be Lowes Wetherill Park.

This uniform shop is located outside Stockland Mall next door to the medical centre and dry cleaners.

We understand there are 2 weeks left before this takes place and the weather is getting colder, however, as per normal students are expected to attend in full winter school uniform in Term 2. Should parents/carers need winter uniform items now, we ask that, you purchase jumpers and stockings of the same colours as the St Narsai College uniform. These items are available at Lowes now.

Undergarments

As shown in the student diary, only white undergarments are permitted to be worn under the college uniform. The white undergarments are an added option for warmth and are not to replace the college uniform. Students are to wear school jumpers and blazers for extra covering and the white undergarment for extra warmth only. White undergarments are not to be seen.

Haircuts


A new phase of unacceptable haircuts is appearing among our male students. Please note, as shown in the student diary, blended haircuts with a minimum of 1 are acceptable. No male student is permitted to have zero or skin fades as part of their haircut and the new trend of "mullets" (sides shaved and the middle grown long) are not permitted. Any student seen to be non-compliant risks being suspended.

PUBLIC BUS SERVICE FROM TWAY (PRARIEWOOD)

We are pleased to announce we have 6 buses leaving Prariewood Tway for St Narsai every morning. Bus times are: 7.29am, 7.36am, 7.41am, 7.48am (new additional service), 7.54am and 8.04am.

It is extremely important for parents who drop their children off at the Tway to drop them off between the times of 7:20am and before 7:40am so they can travel on the two early buses.



Please ensure your child is arriving to school on time and safe.

The Extension English Class Explores the Realm of Gothic Fiction and Unleashes their Creative Writing Skills

We are excited to share an update from our Year II Extension English class, where our talented students have been diving into the mysterious and captivating world of Gothic fiction. Over the past weeks, we have been honing our creative writing skills while immersing ourselves in the spine-chilling tales of the genre's most renowned authors.

From the Science Department

Dear parents/guardians,

Late last term, we were fortunate enough to have our future scientists from our sister school, St. Hurmizd, join us for a day as a St. Narsai student. Students were able to experience Science in all its glory, led by Mr. Brian Parker. Experiments were based on the notion of rockets and jet propulsion reactions. Students created dry ice rockets, investigated the reaction of acid and vinegar, and witnessed the balloon rocket experiment. Their excitement and enthusiasm was evident and we look forward to seeing them as St. Narsai students in the near future!

Last term also saw the start of the Celestino Science Park Challenge, led by Mr. Elias Atto and Mrs. Ramina Moshi with select students. The Celestino Science Park Challenge is an annual competition for students in years 7-12 to design and build a sustainable, resilient, and livable community using Sydney Science Park as the centrepiece. The challenge is designed to engage students in STEM education and to give them the opportunity to collaborate with industry experts and bring their ideas to life. The challenge is divided into three stages:

Stage 1: Students are given a challenge question that revolves around a complex issue in the planning for infrastructure at Sydney Science Park. They must work together to research the issue, develop a solution, and create a presentation to share their ideas.

Stage 2: The top teams from Stage 1

are invited to attend an urban thinktank where they will have the opportunity to meet with industry experts and mentors who will guide them on their projects.

Stage 3: The teams from Stage 2 will then have the opportunity to build their models and present their solutions to a panel of judges.

The Celestino Science Park Challenge is a great opportunity for students to learn about STEM education, sustainability, and urban planning. It is also a chance for them to collaborate with industry experts and bring their ideas to life.

This term also promises to be a fruitful and an exciting one for Science. Students across all grades have commenced their new units for the term and activities across have been organised catering for various year groups. As part of a depth study, Year 11 Biology students been developing their working scientifically skills by conducting experiments they have designed on the study of factors that affect enzyme activity. Year 8 students have been completing their unit on body systems, this has included dissections of hearts and frogs. The dissections have assisted students in learning about the internal structure and the interrelation of tissues and organs.

Year 10 students, interested in stage 6 chemistry and physics, have also started attending tutorials as part of the entry process for the subjects. Students will have to complete a workbook during these tutorials followed by an entry exam.

If meeting the minimum requirements, they will be allowed entry into the subjects for 2024. The sciences are rigorous subjects and historically students have struggled because they lack the fundamental scientific skills needed to excel. These tutorials allow students to have a taste of the subjects prior to selecting them and also allow them to assess their understanding and ability before making the commitment to choose them for stage 6.

The ICAS Science Assessment is being held later in the term. St. Narsai will be taking part in it. Every year, ICAS organises online assessments designed to recognize and reward academic excellence for high-school students to participate in. The assessment is an hour, multiple choice competition testing critical-thinking and problem-solving skills, not just factual recall. Questions are set in real-life, contemporary contexts, making them relatable and interesting. The competition provides a rewarding opportunity for students to extend themselves beyond school Science through a challenging exam.

We hope to see a growth in passion and excitement for science across the school as we continue providing opportunities for students to extend themselves and see the work of Science ground them.
